How did this decision show what the protagonist finds important? Explain whether you agree or disagree with the main character's decision.</i>
Enriched (or those interested in Black Diamond)	After completing the book, write a one- to two-paragraph response answering the following: <i>As the book ends, identify and analyze an important decision made by the protagonist. How does this decision display growth or change in the character?</i>

Suggestions for choosing a summer reading book that is perfect for you!




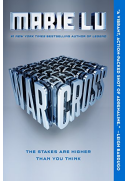

Grim. Dark. Hopeless. You will venture out of our world to a new and magical location where adventure awaits. Join the characters on unpredictable journeys through unpredictable lands!</i></p>

Or perhaps learn more about yourself through the realistic stories of characters. Or perhaps step into the characters' shoes and understand their perspectives, even though they differ from yours. <p style="text-align: center;"><i>All American Boys</i> Brendan Kiely & Jason Reynolds</p> 	<p>A bag of chips. That's all sixteen-year-old Rashad is looking for at the corner bodega. What he finds instead is a cop, Paul Galluzzo, who mistakes Rashad for a shoplifter and mistakes Rashad's pleadings that he's stolen nothing for belligerence as refusal to stay still as ordered. But how can you stay still when someone is pounding your face into the concrete pavement? There were witnesses: Quinn Collins—a basketball player and Rashad's classmate who has been raised by Paul since his own father died—and a video camera. Soon the beating is all over the news and Paul is threatened with accusations of prejudice and racial brutality. Quinn refuses to believe that the man who has basically been his savior could possibly be guilty. When Isabel meets Curzon, a slave with ties to the Patriots, he encourages her to spy on her owners. <p style="text-align: center;"><i>Six Crimson Cranes</i> Elizabeth Lim</p> 	<p>Shiori, the only princess of Kiata, has forbidden magic running through her veins. Normally she conceals it well, but on the morning of her wedding, Shiori loses control.</p> <p>Raikama, her stepmother, has dark magic of her own, and she banishes the young princess, turning her brothers into cranes, and warning Shiori that she must speak of it to no one: for with every word that escapes her lips, one of her brothers will die.</p> <p>Penniless, voiceless, and alone, Shiori searches for her brothers, and, on her journey, uncovers a conspiracy to overtake the throne—a conspiracy more twisted and deceitful, more cunning and complex, than even Raikama's betrayal. Only Shiori can set the kingdom to rights, but to do so she must place her trust in the very boy she fought so hard <i>not</i> to marry. <p><i>March</i> John Lewis & Andrew Aydin</p> 	<p>Congressman John Lewis one of the key figures of the civil rights movement. His commitment to justice has taken him from an Alabama sharecropper's farm to the halls of Congress, from a segregated schoolroom to the 1963 March on Washington, and from receiving beatings from state troopers to receiving the Medal of Freedom from the first African-American president. <i>March</i> is a vivid first-hand account of John Lewis' lifelong struggle for civil and human rights, meditating in the modern age on the distance traveled since the days of Jim Crow and segregation. Now, his own comics bring those days to life for a new audience, testifying to a movement whose echoes will be heard for generations.</p>	<p>Nonfiction Graphic Novel Series Book!</p>
<p><i>Red Kayak</i> Priscilla Cummings</p> 	<p>Brady loves life on the Chesapeake Bay with his friends J.T. and Digger. But rich families are moving into the area, and while Brady befriends some of them, like the DiAngelos, his parents and friends are bitter about the changes. Tragedy strikes when the DiAngelos' kayak overturns in the bay, and Brady wonders if it was more than an accident. 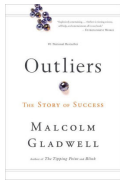

<p><i>The Book Thief</i> Markus Zusak</p> 	<p>It is 1939. Nazi Germany. The country is holding its breath. Death has never been busier, and will become busier still. Liesel Meminger is a foster girl living outside of Munich, who scratches out a meager existence for herself by stealing when she encounters something she can't resist—books. With the help of her accordion-playing foster father, she learns to read and shares her stolen books with her neighbors during bombing raids as well as with the Jewish man hidden in her basement.</p>	<p>Historical Fiction/Drama</p>
<p><i>Code Talker</i> Joseph Bruchac</p> 	<p>Throughout World War II, in the conflict fought against Japan, Navajo code talkers were a crucial part of the U.S. effort, sending messages back and forth in an unbreakable code that used their native language. They braved some of the heaviest fighting of the war, and with their code, they saved countless American lives. Yet their story remained classified for more than twenty years.</p>	<p>Historical Fiction/Drama</p>
<p><i>Just Mercy</i> Bryan Stevenson</p> 	<p>Bryan Stevenson was a young lawyer when he founded the Equal Justice Initiative, a legal practice dedicated to defending those most desperate and in need: the poor, the wrongly condemned, and women and children trapped in the farthest reaches of our criminal justice system. One of his first cases was that of Walter McMillian, a young man who was sentenced to die for a notorious murder he insisted he didn't commit. The case drew Bryan into a tangle of conspiracy, political machination, and legal brinkmanship—and transformed his understanding of mercy and justice forever.</p>	<p>Nonfiction</p>

Malcolm Gladwell





But Xiomara has plenty she wants to say, and she pours all her frustration and passion onto the pages of a leather notebook—especially after she catches feelings for a boy in her bio class named Aman, who her family can never know about. With Mami’s determination to force her daughter to obey the laws of the church, Xiomara understands that her thoughts are best kept to herself. They have launched a plot to raid the treasure hoard guarded by Smaug the Magnificent, a large and very dangerous dragon.
