Summer Reading Book Choices

Reading Directions: Rising sixth graders should maintain their reading lives over the summer months. We offer a list of books organized alphabetically by title with genre and level information. We recommend students explore and read with consideration of both interest and reading level. With parent guidance, students may choose any book from the list to use for their summer reading work.

Suggestions for choosing a summer reading book that is perfect for you!

- ★ **Consider Genre** - Think about books you have enjoyed in the past. Is there a certain genre you enjoy reading the most? Would you like to read more books of that style? If so, start by looking at books offered in that genre.
- ★ **Consider Author** - Is there a certain author whose writing you have enjoyed? Are any of their other books on the list?
- ★ **Stay Open-Minded** - Is there a book that you might not usually select, but that someone has recommended or that has caught your attention? Try it! You may always switch if the book does not work for you.
- ★ **Be Mindful of Reading Level** - As you move to middle school, we encourage readers to choose books by **interest**, because if you are interested in a text, you will be more likely to do the work to understand the story and its meaning. However, be mindful if a text is too difficult for you to understand. Be willing to put it down and say, "I'll try this one again in a few months!" Your teachers will support you with this work throughout sixth grade.




Books with titles beginning with A-C

<p><i>Amina's Voice</i> Hena Kahn</p> 	<p>Amina has never been comfortable in the spotlight. She is happy just hanging out with her best friend, Soojin. Except, now that she's in middle school, everything feels different. Soojin is suddenly hanging out with Emily, one of the "cool" girls in the class, and even talking about changing her name to something more "American." Does Amina need to start changing too? Or hiding who she is to fit in? 




<p><i>Dancing Home</i> Alma Flor Ada & Gabriel Zubizarreta</p> 	<p>Mexico may be her parents' home, but it's certainly not Margie's. She has convinced the other kids at school she is one-hundred percent American. But when her Mexican cousin Lupe visits, the image she's created for herself crumbles. Things aren't easy for Lupe, either. Mexico hadn't felt like home since her father left to find work, and learning a new language in a new school is tough. In time, the girls' individual steps find the rhythm of one shared dance, and they learn what "home" really means.</p>	<p><i>Realistic Fiction</i> Level S</p>
<p><i>The Epic Fail of Arturo Zamora</i> Pablo Cartaya</p> 	<p>Save the restaurant. Save the town. Get the girl. Make Abuela proud. Can thirteen-year-old Arturo Zamora do it all or is he in for a BIG, EPIC FAIL? For Arturo, summertime in Miami means playing basketball until dark, sipping mango smoothies, and keeping cool under banyan trees. And maybe a few shifts as junior lunchtime dishwasher at Abuela's restaurant. Maybe. But this summer, he almost doesn't notice the smarmy land developer who rolls into town and threatens to change it. Arturo refuses to let his family and community go down without a fight, and as he schemes, Arturo discovers the power of poetry and protest through untold family stories and the work of José Martí.</p>	<p><i>Realistic Fiction</i> Level W</p>
<p><i>The Girl Who Drank the Moon</i> Kelly Barnhill</p> 	<p>Every year, the people of the Protectorate leave a baby as an offering to the witch who lives in the forest. But the witch in the Forest, Xan, rescues the children and delivers them to welcoming families on the other side of the forest, nourishing the babies with starlight on the journey. One year, Xan accidentally feeds a baby moonlight instead of starlight, filling the ordinary child with extraordinary magic. Xan decides she must raise this girl as her own. Hank is terrified; writing one good sentence is hard for him, so how in the world is he going to write five whole paragraphs? Hank comes up with a plan: instead of writing what he did on vacation, he'll show what he did. But when Hank's "living essay" becomes a disaster, he finds himself in detention. 	General Directions <i>* Please see each assignment sheet for specific instructions. *</i>
Part 1: Graphic Organizer	The graphic organizer gives you space to provide direct quotes about specific literary elements in the text and space to analyze those quotes. You may either write your responses by hand, or you may type your work.
Part 2: Paragraph	Select a quote from your graphic organizer in part one and construct a one paragraph response. The quote may focus on any literary element, including character, setting, conflict, style/figurative language, or theme. You may either write your response by hand, or you may type your work.
Optional Enrichment Work: One Pager	A one pager is a one-page document that allows you to express your understanding of the text through writing, drawing, and other forms of written expression. You will think about various elements of the text and complete the assignment following the directions for each box on the page. You may either create your one pager by hand, or you may create your work digitally.

Directions: As you read, identify 1 quote from the text that shows each listed literary element. You should collect **4 different quotes** in total. Write the direct quotes and then analyze each quote by responding to the guided prompts on the left. You may either write your responses by hand, or you may type your work.

<p>Character: What character (personality) trait(s) are revealed in the direct quote? Explain your answer.</p>		
<p>Setting: What details in the quote help you visualize the setting? How does the setting affect the events of the story? Explain your answer.</p>		
<p>Conflict: What problem is revealed in the quote? How does it affect the main character? How does the character respond? Explain your answer.</p>		
<p>Theme: What life lesson does the author reveal in this quote? What does the author want you (the reader) to learn at the end of the story? Explain your answer.</p>		

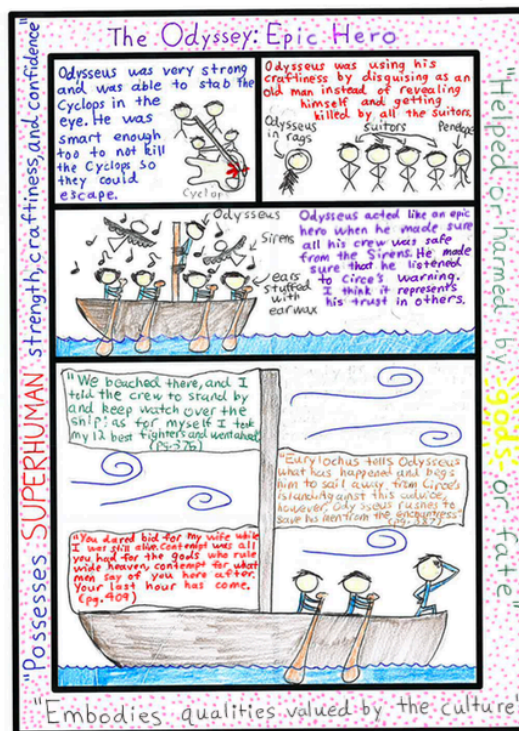
OPTIONAL WORK : One Pager

Directions: Following the guidelines below, complete the one-page diagram with the assigned content for each box. Choose visual and written ways to express meaning from the text, along with your understanding of the author's work. You may either create your one pager by hand, or you may create your work digitally.

Your one pager should include:

- **Border: Character**
Include words, quotes, and/or images that represent the characters. You could focus on their traits, emotions, relationships, inner thoughts, or other elements of character.
- **Box 1: Setting**
Include words, quotes, and/or images that represent the setting of the story.
- **Box 2: Conflict**
Include words, quotes, and/or images that represent the main conflict in the text.
- **Box 3: Theme**
Include words, quotes, and/or images that represent the theme of the text.
- **Box 4: Style/Figurative Language**
Include words, quotes, and/or images that represent the style of the writing. This could include your interpretation of the author's style or examples of figurative language in the text.
